Message from the President

don't know how I became his bassist, or exactly when it happened, which is unusual. Almost always I choose and chase my bands or artists in advance and reel them in or develop them. But this time, I just woke up as his bassist one day.

Our relationship started off rocky as a result of a poor reaction on my part to a double booking. The error was my fault and after the explosion, I apologized; but it took a while for him to interact with me again. Eventually time healed the wounds I had caused and Gino began working with me, both in chasing gigs and in creating music. Among the many lessons I learned from Gino, grace was one of the first. Learning valuable lessons from him would be a recurring theme in our relationship.

As my relationship with both Gino and his wife, singer Jade Bennett-Matteo grew, it became clear that they were searching for musical family and community. Their "We, not Me" mentality became evident fairly quickly and they were an excellent fit with the heart and goals of my label, Lightning in a Bottle Records, and they became a part of the label, and the Cascade Blues Association music community. Gino was a giving resource with endless experiences beyond my

own and a heart eager to share his wisdom. His intelligence empowered him to communicate his deep, unique, and valuable thoughts with great articulation, both verbally and musically. His ability to be bluntly direct with love and without offense was amazing and unmatched. I believe part of that ability was derived from his total lack of a mask. He could not conceal who he was, the sensitivity that came with that, and he did not try.

Gino Matteo's musical

skills were undeniable and impossible to conceal. His own description of great musicians equated them to an "iceberg", with only the very edges of their abilities visible to any observer at a glance, and the true depth of their skills only revealed over time. He certainly exemplified this depth of ability; I doubt that any of us ever fully witnessed the full range of his gifts. His musical tastes and influences were wildly diverse and he was constantly exposing the musicians around him to new music and approaches. And while his public acclaim was in the blues realm, by his own proclamation he was not a blues guitarist but something much broader and more difficult to box up. His sense of tone and use of tools was magical and rare, and their application was always flawless and song serving.

As a performer, his creativity was endless, even

in the context of a live show. Seldom were the songs performed exactly the same show to show, and Gino was always open to real time adjustments in arrangement and set list. Playing with Gino live was a very interactive and reactive experience. He could direct dynamic variations and unexpected breaks effortlessly while revealing a whole new unseen canvas of musicality in the moment. He taught me many lessons in this context and one of the many losses is the premature termination of these lessons. I was not done learning from him.

On many Sundays I attended "church" with Gino. For him, church was an immersive encounter creating music with a random collection of friends assembled

weekly at the former Disney post production studio which he was guiding back to life. Each occasion presented a different collection of players with no running theme other than that of free creativity, appreciation for the process, and gratitude for the moment. The arranged guest for the final "church service" that never happened was Paul Gilbert, of whom Gino was a big fan. I had mentioned Gino to Paul in a text while the Bennett-Matteo Band was playing at the Walla Walla Guitar Festival. Paul looked Gino up and became an immediate fan, gladly accepting the invitation to attend a Sunday "church service" with Gino. We were all very excited for what was going to come at that service, Gino most especially.

I always joke that if you want to meet the most famous blues musicians. stand next to Ben Rice in the lobby of the Orpheum Theater in Memphis, Tennessee during International Blues Challenge week and they will come to you. With Gino, it didn't matter where you stood. Every relevant guitarist within 10 miles was aware of his presence and seeking an audience. It was awesome to observe their respect and awe combined with Gino's humility.

We don't always consciously realize the depth of relevance someone has in our community until they are suddenly and prematurely removed. The vacuum of Gino's absence is tangible to me; both in the emotional response I feel and as evidenced in the wake of lives and projects left guideless with his passing. A modicum of peace is obtained in acknowledging Gino's wisdom in always actively communicating his love and feelings towards those close to him. He always made his love for you clear to you, leaving no unresolved feelings or questions. I know how he felt about me and he knew how I felt about him, without question or doubt.

I am grateful for the lessons I received from Gino Matteo. I will miss him. I encourage all of you to emulate Gino's transparency of love. I will try harder as well.



Blues in the Schools with The Norman Sylvester Band

Celebrating Black History Month

Thad the privilege last **L** month of witnessing Norman Slyvester's musical artistry and educational genius at Maplewood Elementary. It was done in honor of Black History Month and sponsored by the Musicians Union Local 99. Norman and his dedicated and talented band of cohorts have been supportive of the Blues in the Schools educational initiatives in partnership with the Cascade Blues Association for many years. The PTA is heavily engaged at Maplewood and actively works to bring all types of cultural presentations to the school. They contacted the Musicians Union and they donated the band's fee in honor of Black History Month.

The band teaches about beats of Africa, "call & response", Gospel, Delta Blues, Ragtime, Rockn-Roll, Soul, R&B, and Hip Hop to name a few. The amount and depth of the history of the music taught during the show is dependent on the age of





the students. The idea is to keep them engaged while learning and having fun.

Norman and his band have played for students from the Head Start program up through college level. Some of his "talking and playing" solo engagements have been in a history curriculum for high school & universities. The band has played in assemblies, evening events, multi-cultural celebrations, and so on.

Norman Sylvester spearheaded an "Artist in Residency" class for 10 years in middle schools called "Music and Social Change". The teacher arranged for him to focus

on the healing powers of songwriting and how music came alongside social justice in America over the years. The English teacher would help them do writing projects about anything they were passionate about. Then they would meet with Norman and produce a song (e.g. Spoken Word, Rap, etc.). After weeks of developing the students' pieces, the band practicing with them, and singer LaRhonda Steele finding some harmony chorus help. They produced an album! The entire band would set up a recording studio and record their songs -- making a class CD. Another piece of the project was





a live performance at an evening event. They even had one student perform at the Waterfront Blues Festival and quite a few more opportunities at their all-age gigs. Here are a few verses from two of the songs written by the students from Irvington -one heavy about shootings & one lighter about the love of cupcakes!


Blues Review: Joe Louis Walker

Cold is The Night: Reimagined



lues Hall of Famer Joe **D**Louis Walker is back with a bold look to the past and future. His new album "Cold Is The Night: Reimagined", released on Bluesifyin Productions/ sledgehammer blues (a label of Valley Entertainment), is a fresh take on the classic 1986 debut (produced by Bruce Bromberg and Dennis Walker) that launched his career. The modern blues legend has re-recorded and re-energized original tracks, imbuing them with nearly four decades of additional soul, fire, and artistry.

Reflecting on the project, Walker shares, "This was my first album... years worth of music and songs in my head and I finally got a chance to record. The music is the blues but you can hear the influence of gospel and rock... my upbringing and the influence of the San Francisco





rock scene. I'd always hoped that these songs would get another chance to be heard by a wider audience."

A native of San Francisco, Joe Louis Walker first shook the blues world with Cold Is The Night in 1986, announcing the arrival of a major talent. In the years since, he's become "a legendary boundary-pushing icon of modern blues" (NPR) – a four-time Blues Music Award winner, Blues Hall of Fame inductee, and performed on BB King's Grammy winning Blues Summit, James Cotton's Grammy winning Deep in the Blues and had his own Everyone Wants a Piece as a Grammy finalist in 2015. He has

released more than 30 albums over his career.

Widely respected by his peers, Walker has featured an impressive lineup of guest musicians on his albums, including Robert Jr Lockwood, Gatemouth Brown, Otis Rush, Buddy Guy, Taj Mahal, Matt Murphey and Steve Cropper.

Beyond his own projects, Walker has contributed to works by notable artists such as Branford Marsalis and Duke Robillard. He has also shared the stage with legends like Steve Miller, Charlie Musslewhite, Nick Lowe, John Mayall, John Lee Hooker, Buddy Miles, Willie Dixon, Muddy Waters, Jimi Hendrix and Thelonius Monk.
